


Engage Students in Hands-on Learning

A guided field trip at The MAX provides students with information and experiences that meet ELA's standards of Reading Informational Text, Speaking and Listening, and Language, Social Studies' strands of History, Civics, Civil Rights, Economics, and Geography, Science's themes of Life Science, Physical Science, and Earth and Space Science, CTE career pathways such as Arts, Audio-Video Technology, and Communications, Education and Training, and Hospitality and Tourism, and Art's standards concerning Responding and Connecting to the various art forms presented.

MAXClassroom

We can facilitate customizable workshops that extend the classroom experience for an additional fee. Below are just a few examples of what's possible.

Eighth Grade MS Studies Class: Choose an artist featured in the museum and create a word-art collage that embodies that person's life, artistic work, and influence.

- MS.2 Compare and contrast the indigenous cultures in Mississippi and assess their lasting impact on the state's history and traditions.
- MS.7 Examine the economic, political, and social changes in the Jim Crow Era Mississippi from the end of Reconstruction through World War II.
- **MS.8** Evaluate the role of Mississippi in the Civil Rights Movement.
- MS.9 Analyze the economic characteristics of modern Mississippi.
- **MS.11** Examine the impact of Mississippi artists, musicians, and writers on the state, nation, and world.
- MS.12 Examine the contributions of various ethnic and religious groups in Mississippi.

Tenth Grade English II Class: Write a short story based on photographs taken by Hall of Famer Eudora Welty.

- W.10.3 Write narratives to develop real or imagined experiences or events using effective techniques, well-chosen details, and well-structured event sequences.
- W.10.4 Produce clear and coherent writing in which the development, organization, and style are appropriate to task, purpose, and audience.

- W.10.5 (By continuing the writing assignment after the field trip) Develop and strengthen writing as needed by planning, revising, editing, rewriting, or trying a new approach, focusing on addressing what is most significant for a specific purpose and audience.
- W.10.10 Write routinely over extended time frames (time for research, reflection, and revision) and shorter time frames (a single sitting or a day or two) for a range of tasks, purposes, and audiences.
