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'America at the Crossroads: The GUITAR and a Changing Nation' Exhibition Opens February 10 at The MAX

A Variety of Free and Ticketed Events Will Accompany the Nationally Traveling Exhibit

MERIDIAN, Miss. (January 23, 2024) – The Mississippi Arts + Entertainment Experience (The MAX) on February 10 will open "America at the Crossroads: The GUITAR and a Changing Nation." The traveling exhibition traces the evolution and powerful influence of the guitar, with notable connections to Mississippi. The exhibit and other special events at the museum are expected to attract strong interest among guitarists and other music enthusiasts across the region.

The exhibit, developed by the New York-based National GUITAR Museum, will run through May 11 at The MAX, a one-of-a-kind museum devoted to telling the story of Mississippi's creative legacy while inspiring future creatives. The MAX is located in historic downtown Meridian. Visit Meridian, Threefoot Hotel, DC Guitar, Dixie Roofing and Buck and Barbara Thomas are among the exhibit sponsors.

"America at the Crossroads" will feature 40 instruments, along with wall banners and videos, recalling the guitar's role at important points in American history. Modern guitars and a Spanish vihuela from the 1500s, an early stringed instrument linked to the evolution of the guitar, are part of the collection.

The visiting exhibit "traces the evolution of an easily transported and adaptable string instrument central to the Mississippi music story, especially to the development of the Delta blues," said Phillip Bolin, the museum's exhibits registrar. "The 'crossroads' reference in the exhibit's title allows us to give fresh attention to a popular legend – reaching back nearly a century – that brings the supernatural into play in accounts of one musician's quest for greatness."

As the story goes, a young Robert Johnson, frustrated with his limited skills as a musician, met the devil at night at a Mississippi Delta road junction and traded his soul for blues mastery.

Johnson penned "Cross Road Blues" in 1932, his performance reflecting the Mississippi Delta blues style. Another Mississippi blues artist, Elmore James, paid tribute to Johnson when he recorded "Standing at the Crossroads" in 1954. Johnson, like B.B. King and Elvis Presley, is featured in The MAX's Hall of Fame, which features dozens of legends from various arts disciplines.

The MAX is also partnering with Peavey Electronics to display unique guitars from their private collection, including a Peavey Wolfgang created with Eddie Van Halen and the original trade show display of the Peavey T-60 guitar. Created in the mid-1970s, the Peavey T-60 was the first musical instrument made using computer numerical controlled (CNC) machinery, an innovation that single-handedly brought instrument-making into the modern era and revolutionized the guitar industry.
